



The Centre for Adivasi Studies and Museum is one of the six research centers of Vidyasagar University devoted to the study and preservation of rich tribal and folk culture of the country. It houses a tribal museum that displays the representative tribal art and culture and takes care of the artefacts, works for documentation and preservation of cultural and natural heritage. Our country does not have many tribal museums. The 'Centre for Adivasi Studies and Museum' (CASM), Vidyasagar University started as an 'Adivasi Museum' in 2014, however, the first meeting was held in 2012. Department of Santali played an important role at its inception. CASM was developed as an academic Centre in subsequent years with the introduction of M.Phil. and Ph.D. programmes since 2019.

The Centre houses Adivasi Museum that displays the vignettes of tribal life with a focus on Eastern India. The instruments and implements of economic activities, household utensils, musical instruments, dress and ornaments, pata paintings are on the display in the five galleries of the museum.

The Centre regularly organises special lectures, seminar, workshop, museum visits and outreach activities. It has collaboration with Russian Academy of Sciences, Moscow. The volume 1 of the CASM Newsletter reports activities of the Centre from 1 April, 2023 to 30 March, 2024.





Special Lecture










New Panel on Tribal Scripts on Display in CASM

Ol Chiki is the script of the Santal language.



Bengal Patachitra Project

CASM organized a 20-day Training-cum-Workshop at Naya village, Pingla, Paschim Medinipur district with the financial grant from Exim India Bank, Mumbai. The project titled 'Bengal Patachitra: Product and

Design Sensitization Workshop' started on 30 October, 2023. The primary objectives of the project were -1) to enhance the existing skills of the artisans with innovative and contemporary designs, and 2) to introduce new products in different materials like leather, ceramics, terracotta etc.

International Workshop and Seminar

CASM organized international workshop and seminar from 22 to 26 February, 2024 and on 5-6 March, 2024 respectively.

The workshop and seminar were organized as a part of the project titled ' Patuas working at the Centre and Peripheries: Engaging with the Folk Artisans beyond Naya and Daspur and Crossing National Borders' collaboratively done by Prof. Sumahan Bandyopadhyay, CASM, VU and Prof. Urmila Chakraborty, State University of Milan, Italy.

The participants of the workshop went to Naya village to work with the patuas. A new scroll based on a folk tale was painted in the workshop and an accompanying song was composed.
